





Overview

English language and skills training are key elements to integrating into Canadian society. Through COSTI's Education Services Division, newcomers can receive these essential services to facilitate their settlement. As part of our commitment to effectively meet the changing needs of newcomers and community landscape, our language and skills training programs continue to evolve.

In 2022/23, we continued to digitize and modernize the delivery of our Education Services programming. We installed interactive equipment in our classrooms, introduced an online learning portal, offering virtual and hybrid programming options.

In the past year, COSTI worked with 3,827 Education Services clients, equipping them with the tools and skills needed to successfully integrate into Canadian society. These services encompassed language training, skills development, and up-skilling opportunities. Committed to equity, diversity and inclusion, COSTI takes pride in providing specialized programs for women, offering a secure and supportive environment for participants to build confidence, learn, and enhance their skills. Notably, in the previous year, 78% of our Education Services clients were women.

Client Story

Accelerating settlement and integration through language and skills training

When Jason arrived in Canada from Shanghai, China in March 2022, he knew that learning English was a key component for his successful integration into his new Canadian life. To achieve this, Jason joined COSTI's Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) program to develop English language skills as part of his settlement journey. Jason started his studies in September 2022, and has made significant progress, he has now attained the Canadian Language Benchmarks (CLB) level 2-3.

By learning alongside fellow students who shared his enthusiasm for English, Jason thrived in a secure and interactive classroom environment. This setting empowered him and his classmates to improve their listening and speaking abilities with confidence. Through personalized language exercises and tailored assistance matching his proficiency level, Jason has gained the self-confidence to develop and apply his English language skills.

Overview

Empowering people with the tools to succeed is at the core of what we do at COSTI. Our Employment Services Division offer supports necessary to help individuals get job-ready. From training to goal setting and résumé writing to networking and confidence building to connecting to the right employers; COSTI helps newcomers to successfully enter or re-enter the labour market.

Programs like our Expressway Cybersecurity
Bridging program and Pathways to Early Childhood
Education help internationally trained newcomers
bridge employment gaps. Individuals get help
with job search, career planning and employment

preparation, and can gain valuable temporary Canadian work experience through mentoring programs for newcomers with professional experience, to reconnect with their careers.

COSTI's Employment Services Division works with individuals to develop career plans, provide networking opportunities and job fairs, and help youth to gain practical experience. As part of our work, COSTI has built relationships with over 230 employer partners, and in 2022/23, successfully helped 70% of job seekers in COSTI's community secure employment.

Client Story

Accelerating the pathway to Canadian work experience

A pre-school teacher in her home country of Sri Lanka, Hasala encountered some challenges in securing employment after arriving in Canada. There was a language barrier, she had no previous Canadian experience, and she was unfamiliar with navigating the Canadian job search landscape. She needed to better understand how to prepare a resume, cover letter, prepare for an interview, improve her English language communication skills, and enhancement training in working with children in a Canadian daycare setting.

In January 2023, an opportunity for Hasala to join COSTI's Pathways to Early Childhood Education (ECE) for Internationally Trained Professionals Program became available, and she started the 12-week program, four of which would be paid work placement, giving her the Canadian knowledge and work experience needed.

Hasala's experience, skills development and learning throughout the program, boosted her confidence and readiness to apply for a job. Shortly after graduating from the program, she was hired as a supply Early Childhood Assistant (ECA) at a childcare centre, and two months later, she was offered a full-time position.

Looking forward, Hasala is preparing to apply for an ECE Apprenticeship program, and eventually get her diploma.

Overview

As a leader in Canada's settlement sector, COSTI plays a pivotal role in facilitating the successful integration of newcomers and established immigrants into their new Canadian lives in the Greater Toronto Area.

COSTI'S Social Services Division provides language and culturally specific programs and services tailored to newcomers, refugees, and individuals in need of assistance in the areas of settlement, housing, family and mental health, domestic violence, seniors, youth, women, and more.

In 2022/23, COSTI's settlement services supported 4,262 individuals. As the issue of affordable housing continues to grow, our services are essential in assisting those in need. In the past year, our housing programs helped over 3,700 people who were either homeless or at risk of homelessness, aiding them in securing permanent housing. Additionally, we provided temporary shelter to over 5,000 individuals.

In April 2022, we proudly introduced our Ukrainian Housing Host program, which facilitated temporary housing for 310 families and extended settlement services to an additional 1,145 Ukrainian individuals.

As a delivery partner of Orientation to Ontario (O2O)/International Student Connect (ISC), COSTI partners with settlement agencies and educational institutions to offer workshops and digital resources to international students and newcomers with diverse immigration statuses. The bilingual program is designed to meet the settlement needs of international students, further enhancing their transition to life in Canada.

Client Story

Journey of Resilience: Two Newcomer Families' Path to Success in Canada

In June 2023, Liudmyla arrived in Canada from Ukraine, with her two young daughters and elderly mother. Seeking temporary housing, Liudmyla was connected to volunteer housing host Rebecca through COSTI's Housing Host program, who herself was new to Canada, having arrived from the United States a few months prior. Rebecca welcomed Liudmyla and her family into her home with open arms and homemade kalach, a Ukrainian traditional bread.

Despite language barriers, tragedy, and separation—Liudmyla lost her brother in the war, and her husband was still fighting in Ukraine—she and her family were determined to overcome their hurdles and succeed in Canada. Working with her COSTI counsellor, Liudmyla and her family developed a comprehensive plan for their integration into Canadian society, received access to vital services, and Liudmyla was assisted with securing employment.

Six months prior to Liudmyla's arrival in Canada, her cousin Siergie and his 12-year-old son had arrived in Canada from Ukraine after Siergie had tragically lost his wife during the second week of the war. Siergie spoke little English and was unable to secure employment up until that time.

With COSTI's help, the cousins were connected and Siergie was assisted with securing employment. Liudmyla and Siergie combined their resources and found an apartment for their families. With assistance and guidance from COSTI, they were able to navigate lease agreements, banking and insurance processes, and through furniture donations, they were able to set up their new home.

In just two months, the two families achieved considerable progress. Liudmyla's two daughters and Siergie's son have integrated into their new Canadian lives, making new friends at their schools, and improving their English skills. Together, they continue their journey of settlement and integration into Canada.

COSTI's Social Services Division provides a range of language-specific and culturally responsive programs and services for newcomers, refugees, and individuals in need of assistance.

Domestic Violence

These programs help to empower and increase safety for newcomer and refugee women and their children. Newcomer women and their dependents who are at risk or have experienced abuse in their relationships have access to language-specific and responsive counselling.

Overview

As global issues and crises continue to force individuals and families to flee their homes, COSTI continues to respond to the humanitarian needs of refugees in Canada. Through our comprehensive assistance, including initial temporary housing, information, orientation and a range of other lifechanging social supports, we enable displaced individuals and families to resettle and establish a sense of community in the Greater Toronto Area.

Last year, COSTI continued to operate its three core Refugee Services programs: Resettlement Assistance Program, Client Support Services, and Hostel Services, serving government-assisted refugees, refugee claimants, inner-city families, victims of domestic violence, and chronically homeless families and individuals.

In 2022/23, COSTI's Resettlement Assistance Program and Client Support Services supported 4,416 refugees, as well as 2,154 refugee claimants through our Hostel Services. These crucial services help to facilitate the integration and settlement process of newcomers, enabling individuals to independently access government, health, and community services.

Through sessions with his dedicated counsellors, Farid received valuable insights, practical advice, and a clear roadmap to achieve his general and professional settlement and professional milestones. The guidance he received was tailored to his strengths, skills, and aspirations, making the entire process personalized and purposeful.

As part of his settlement journey, Farid participated in COSTI's Enhanced Language Training program, where he received help and guidance in creating his Canadian resume and cover letter, and learning Canadian business language training, pre-employment preparation, and more, as he began his professional career in Canada. Farid has now achieved his professional goals and is working as an Information and Employment Counsellor in the social services sector.

Client Support Services

Supports the integration into Canadian society for government-assisted refugees (GARs) who have transitioned from temporary accommodation and settled in the Greater Toronto Area through client support services such as information, orientation, and referrals; mental health support, interpretation, government document assistance, supportive counselling and more.

International Student Connect Program / Étudiants internationaux se connectent

The International Student Connect (ISC) project is an Ontario Government supported bilingual initiative, designed to identify and develop an appropriate service response to meet the settlement needs of International Students. COSTI leads ISC in collaboration with francophone partner CSCHN, 16 SDAs, and 23 Educational Institutions. Its objective is to support the successful settlement and integration of IS by increasing their knowledge about the settlement process, improving their access to resources and supports, enabling access to information about immigration options to transition to permanent residency, and facilitating their readiness to develop a post-graduation settlement transition plan. It represents an innovative collaboration between settlement service providers and post-secondary institutions.

ISC provides international students and accompanying family members with settlement information on over

30 topics through 1-2 hour Let's Connect sessions or one-on-one services Service Delivery Partners at the educational institutions' locations/online.

Orientation To Ontario (O2o) / L'Ontario, c'est chez

Orientation to Ontario / L'Ontario, c'est chez moi (O2O) is a bilingual program funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada and the Government of Ontario. O2O has been designed to expedite and facilitate the settlement of newcomers to Ontario and help them make better-informed choices. The program offers a client-centered standardized approach for providing information and orientation services in Ontario with a network of 31 partners serving newcomers, francophones, refugees, women, youth, LGBTQ+ clients in 45 communities in hybrid, virtual and in-person formats.

COLLABORATIONS & PARTNERSHIPS

The print and digital resources (Workbook, Factsheets, Webinars on YouTube, Settlement Plan, Multilingual Chatbot ArriveON App) cater to different learning styles. In addition, O2O serves as a launchpad for settlement services.

Planning For Canada

Provides services to economic and family class immigrants before their arrival into Canada. COSTI is a Provincial Advisor of this initiative, helping immigrants prepare for their move, settlement, and employment in Canada. This program is led by Colleges and Institutes Canada, the Canadian Immigrant Integration Project (CIIP) aims to consolidate and expand the delivery model of online advisory services to individuals overseas. The project employs a coordinated model that fosters more effective partnerships among key stakeholders in the settlement sector, college partners across the provinces and employment support organizations.

Success - AEIP

The Active Engagement Integration Project (AEIP) operated by SUCCESS, continues to provide both settlement and employment essential one-on-one guidance, planning, and assistance to clients before they arrive in Canada. AEIP's assessment and planning provide clients destined for Canada with a tailored personalized plan and connect them with partners on the ground across Canada. COSTI is proud to partner with SUCCESS in delivering settlement, referral and advice services to clients destined for Ontario while still overseas in their country.

COSTI provides pre-departure support to overseas individuals destined to arrive in Ontario. Services include information and referrals to community agencies, educational institutions and employment support organizations across Ontario.

Welcome Group Model

Since 2021 COSTI has partnered with the Together Project in delivering a standardized model of volunteer engagement with government-sponsored refugees. The Together Project connects refugee newcomers and Canadians to build stronger, more integrated communities through three program areas: matching, community and research. The Together Project developed the "Welcome Group" model in close partnership with COSTI. The model builds on existing family matching programs and connects Canadians with government-sponsored refugees and refugee claimants from all countries of origin who arrive at COSTI's Ralph Chiodo Family Immigrant Reception Centre and temporary hotel accommodations.

With the ever-changing settlement and labour market environment, COSTI will leverage its research capacity and employ a systematic process to ensure quality standards and programs. COSTI's focus will remain firmly on identifying client's individual and family needs, service gaps and engaging partners to establish an ecosystem that provides a holistic wraparound approach; one that is flexible and supportive in ensuring a comprehensive compendium of services and connections for our clients.


both online and in person, and provided event support for holiday parties and donation distributions for newcomer families at COSTI's temporary housing locations. 16,269
