We are so excited to report that COSTI's impact for its work last year was recognized across the sector with multiple awards celebrating the strength of its programs, people and partnerships.

COSTI received the Community Impact Award at the CanadianSME National Business Awards 2024 for the second year in a row. As one of the few non-profits recognized on this national platform, the award highlights the measurable difference COSTI continues to make in the lives of newcomers and Torontonians in need.

The City of Toronto named COSTI a 2025 Community Champion, one of just seven organizations selected from over 250 nominees. The award recognized the work of COSTI's frontline staff, acknowledging

our long-standing service to equity-deserving communities and its city-wide impact.

COSTI was also recognized by United Way Greater Toronto as a Local Leader 2024 for surpassing its workplace fundraising goal by 200%, driven by strong staff engagement and shared purpose. And the Vaughan Welcome Centre was also recognized with Achēv's 2025 Community Service Partner Award for its work in supporting newcomer communities in York Region.

Each award reflects COSTI's commitment to people, partnerships and progress.



Success in action

Kira's Canadian Classroom

When Kira Herzhanovska arrived in Canada from Ukraine with her husband and a teenage son, she brought decades of experience as an early childhood educator, though her English-speaking skills were limited. "Without a good level of English, it was difficult to communicate, solve everyday issues or find any job, let alone re-enter my profession," she recalls from her early days in Canada.

COSTI changed that.

Kira enrolled in our English classes, joined the Conversation Club and completed Workplace Language Training designed for early childhood education. With guidance from her instructors and career specialist, she improved her English, prepared for interviews, created a strong resume and obtained the certifications she needed to return to her profession.

Today, Kira is employed in a kindergarten, applying her 20 years of expertise in child development in a new setting. She continues to grow in Canada's education system.

"COSTI gave me more than education. It gave me support, motivation and a path forward" she expresses joyfully.



Success in action



Mr. Raguseo's Home Away from Home

84-year-old Stefano Raguseo was one of the first clients to join the Calabrian Benevolent Seniors Day Program when it was first launched in October 2016, attending the centre just twice a week. On seeing how much he enjoyed the activities, care and friendships he built here, his family soon increased his visits to five days a week.

Unfortunately, the onset of pandemic in 2020 led to closure of this program. This disrupted his routine and paused the support that had become so important and integral to him and his family. When the program reopened in 2024 at a new location, his family acted quickly to re-enroll him despite the long travel from Maple, York Region. Now, Mr. Raguseo attends the daycare centre every day, enjoying renewed connections and meaningful engagement.

"You have no idea how happy I was when I heard the program reopened at this new site. I knew my dad would be happy again. You and your team at Calabrian Benevolent Seniors Day Program took such good care of him, that it was heartbreaking when we learned of the closure during the pandemic. Thank God, everything is over, and he is able to return to your care. I am so thankful!" exclaims his daughter.

The Calabrian Benevolent Seniors Day Program was founded by the Calabrian Benevolent Association of Ontario and is managed by COSTI.

Success in action

Froogh's New Canadian Roots

Froogh Sadeqi and her family arrived in Canada in November 2024, facing loneliness as newcomers without relatives or contacts in the country. COSTI's Resettlement Assistance Program welcomed them warmly and provided essential support, right from helping them open their Canadian bank accounts to finding housing, all within their first month of landing.

Since then, COSTI has continued to guide Froogh's family with professional counselling and ongoing support. Froogh has progressed rapidly through language courses and is preparing to start high school. She is also advancing through COSTI's Newcomer Entrepreneur Women program, aiming to launch her own business with government support.

"Thank you, Canada, for saving our lives. And thank you, COSTI, for standing beside us throughout our journey," Frough said.

At COSTI, we believe that creating a home is more than meeting basic needs. It's about belonging, growing and contributing to the fabric of Canada. Froogh's story is one of many where hope is turning into an opportunity with COSTI's support.



Volunteer reflection

Volunteers are at the heart of COSTI. They bring their talents, experiences and compassion to everything they do, helping newcomers feel welcome and supported as they begin their lives in Canada. Through their commitment, they foster belonging, build stronger communities and remind our clients that they are never alone in their journey.

One of our most dedicated volunteers is Mariam Elsawy. Since January 2025, Mariam has given her time to support online ESL classes in Brampton, where she offered encouragement and one-on-one help to students learning English. She has also assisted newcomer families through our Community Connections Program, providing interpretation support and helping them adjust to the everyday skills needed to settle. With her background in health sciences and psychology from Carleton University and her experience as a student leader, Mariam continues to be a compassionate guide for others who are working to make Canada their home.



I started volunteering with COSTI because I saw myself in its clients. I immigrated to Canada on my own in 2016, so I know the struggles that come with being a newcomer. From mastering the language to familiarizing yourself with the culture, it really does take a lot of effort and can often feel isolating. Looking back, I wish I had someone who could hold my hand and walk me through all of it. Today, I am glad I can be that someone for others who are going through the same challenges. Even more, I am grateful for all the amazing friendships I made along the way!

Service pillars



Significant Education Services

Helping newcomers and community members build the skills they need to succeed, Education Services delivers language and skills training designed to support newcomers from literacy to Canadian Language Benchmark 6. Flexible course options include in-person, online and hybrid formats to fit diverse needs. Alongside English language instruction, we provide digital skills development and employment-related training tailored to the needs of refugees, asylum claimants, visitors and work permit holders. Key programs include LINC, Enhanced Language Training (ELT), English as a Second Language (ESL), Workplace Language Training, Pre-Arrival Services and specialized initiatives such as LINC for Women and Seniors, CELPIP exam preparation, Microsoft Word and Excel training and women's EmpowerHer Horizons.



Employment Services

COSTI connects individuals from varied backgrounds, including newcomers, youth and internationally trained professionals with the resources they need to succeed in today's competitive and challenging job market. Our comprehensive support includes pre-employment workshops, skills training, job placement, career development and workplace culture orientation. Delivered both in person and online, these services help clients secure, retain and grow in stable and meaningful employment. We also partner with employers to build pathways that meet labour market needs. Programs such as Employment Ontario Services, netWORKS, Pathways to Employment, Mindset Makeover, and others address the unique challenges faced by the Greater Toronto Area's diverse communities.



As a leader in Canada's settlement sector, COSTI supports newcomers, including refugees and asylum claimants, in starting their new lives in the Greater Toronto Area. To provide holistic, trauma-informed care, our Social Services Division offers compassionate, culturally responsive programs that address settlement, housing, family and mental health, domestic violence, and the unique needs of seniors, youth and women. Alongside direct client support, the division builds sector capacity through staff training, partnerships and public education. Digital tools like webinars, toolkits, chatbots and mobile apps help broaden access. Key programs include Orientation to Ontario, International Student Connect, housing support, seniors' day programs, family and mental health counselling, newcomer settlement services and creative art groups that promote healing, inclusion and long-term well-being for our clients.



Refugee Services

In a world where crises force thousands to leave everything behind, COSTI stands ready to welcome refugees with practical support and compassion. Our Refugee Services Division helps newcomers find safety and stability through temporary housing, intensive case management and resettlement assistance across the Greater Toronto Area. We guide individuals and families as they navigate local systems, connect with community resources and adjust to life in Canada. Operating three core programs, namely Resettlement Assistance Program, Client Support Services and Hostel Services, we provide comprehensive care that includes orientation, housing support and wraparound services. This approach ensures refugees can build a new life with confidence and hope.




